GCSE grades are changing

GCSEs in England are being reformed and will be graded with a new scale from 9 to 1, with 9 being the highest grade. English Literature, English Language and Maths will be the first subjects to be graded in this way, affecting our current Year 11s, for the 2017 results. Most other subjects with the highest numbers of candidates (e.g. arts, humanities, languages) will follow in 2018, affecting our current Year 10s. The remainder of the subjects will change for the results in 2019, affecting our current Year 9s. During this transition, students will receive a mixture of letter and number grades. This is happening as GCSEs are being reformed to make them more challenging, to keep pace with employers' and universities demands. In the first year each new GCSE subject is introduced, students who would have got a grade C or better will get a grade 4 or better. Grade 9 will be more difficult to achieve than a grade A*. Together with trustee Michael Jeffrey, Neville McKay, partner in Aon Hewitt (a global leader in human resource solutions), was involved in designing and rolling out the very first Alumni Academy.

Neville shares some thoughts on the first few weeks of this exciting project: "The pupils have now been exposed to a number of new ideas and concepts. They have been given challenges to work through and techniques to practice. We now need to build on this by completing the technical content of the course and then giving the pupils time and support to develop their business ideas. Undoubtedly this will be a very big challenge for them but we are optimistic that they will be enthused to give it their very best. The students will undoubtedly encounter many hurdles on their personal journeys. Let's hope they learn much in the process – including resilience and determination – in preparation for future, hard won success."

Year 12 students attended a variety of talks from people who work in the chemical or engineering industry. There were talks on problems we face feeding the world's population, how engineering is helping medicine to improve and how drugs are formulated. It was a fantastic day where the students got a real insight into what types of skills are required for many of the scientific jobs

available. It was also an excellent chance for students to see what types of jobs there are that are related to science.

Some of the talks really opened their eyes to some of the problems we face as a society and what is being done to try and overcome these problems. It also inspired many of them to think about using their Science A levels to help overcome the future problems that we may encounter.



Year 11 visit to Hampton Court School

A few weeks ago, we attended a school trip to Hampton school in south west London. We were able to meet 4 survivors of 4 separate genocides, Cambodia, The Holocaust, Bosnia and Rwanda. It was a very inspirational and eye opening experience for everyone involved with the trip.

During the morning we were put into groups and listened to one of the four survivors and their experience of genocide. After listening to their accounts we were also given an opportunity to ask further questions.

After having lunch we did a number of workshops involving a 'Question and Answer' with BBC presenter Dan Snow. We then began to discuss with students from other schools how we could share our knowledge within our wider school communities.

The first step in doing this was a presentation in year 11 assembly this week where we were able to disseminate the knowledge gained. It is our hope that over the coming months we will be developing further ideas for a genocide awareness campaign. This campaign will involve the whole school and enable students of other year groups to gain an understanding of this important issue.

Sickness

It is a legal obligation that children of school age attend school regularly. If a pupil is sick, the parent or guardian should telephone the school that morning. He or she should be kept at home until well, and a note of explanation sent to the Form Tutor on the day of return to school. If no telephone call has

been received by 9.30am on the first day of absence, the school's Attendance Officer will make contact to confirm the reasons for absence.

If a child falls ill in school, parents will be contacted to arrange for their child to be collected and taken home. In the event of an accident requiring urgent medical attention, an ambulance will be called and parents informed.

If your child has to leave school during the day for an appointment, please send your child in to school on the day of the appointment, with a note stating the time they need to leave school, along with the appointment card where possible. Your child will then be able to obtain a pink slip which will release them from their lesson.

How a pupil obtains a Pink slip

(To leave school during the day)

- 1. **REGISTER** in form.
- 2. Go to HOY for the note to be signed.
- 3. Go straight to the Attendance Office to collect a Pink slip.

All of the above must be completed during MORNING registration.
